Cathy has participated in a number of masterclasses, notably those of which including Mika Sasaki, David Jalbert, Jasmin Arakawa, and Stephané Lemelin. Apart from her work as a soloist, Cathy is also an active collaborative pianist, regularly accompanying since high school, and for this was awarded the Ontario Vocal Festival Leadership Award. Outside of collaborative projects, Cathy is also passionate about community outreach, regularly performing for churches and retirement homes such as Glenn Abbey United Church, Timothy Eaton Memorial Church, Briton House, New Horizon Tower, Southbrook Retirement Home, Bradgate Arms, Hazelton Place, and Amica on the Avenue.
